Adinkra signs, symbols and cloths are designed and made by the Ashanti people who come from the Ivory Coast and Ghana. Sometimes the signs and symbols are repeated to make effective lengths of fabrics originally worn by royalty and other important people in society. Symbols are mostly positive and are seen as strong and important and used to tell stories and legends. Many symbols are about animals and plants, other symbols may be about feelings and personal qualities. Now symbols are used and worn by everyone.

Vocabulary

Adinkra - a people of West Africa, part of the larger Ashanti tribe.

Symbol - an abstract shape or image that represents or stands for something else.

Abstract - Something that is not realistic.

Print block - a surface or shape that can be used to make an image again and again.

Composition - The arrangement of shapes, colours etc in a piece of art work.

Informal pattern - a random repeat called a Motif design.

Formal pattern - a design that is a regular and structured repeat.

Harmony colours - colours that are next to each other on the colour wheel.

Accent colour - a colour from the opposite side of the colour wheel.
