KEY CONCEPTS

'Roaring 20's' - Phrase used to describe the drastic changes in the United States during the 1920s.

'Bootlegging' - Since they hid the bottles in their boots they began to be called bootleggers.

'Jazz Age' - Jazz music and dance styles rapidly gained nationwide popularity in the United States

Prohibition— Law against the making or selling alcohol or alcoholic beverages. Between 1920 and 1933 the making and selling of alcoholic beverages was forbidden by the 18th Amendment.
