Covid 19 Update

As I am sure you are aware, whilst restrictions have been lifted, Covid 19 has not gone away and it continues to impact on students and staff. It has impacted some schools to the extent that enforced closure has been necessary.



I again want to reiterate how much I have appreciated families communicating with us promptly in the event of a case and the steps they have taken to follow protocols. It is worth highlighting that the government has not yet updated advice to school. However, they have produced the following news article relating to the main changes with effect from today at <https://www.gov.uk/government/news/government-sets-out-next-steps-for-living-with-covid>

- From today, updated guidance will advise people with symptoms of a respiratory infection, including COVID-19, and a high temperature or who feel unwell to try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people, until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature.
- From 1 April, anyone with a positive COVID-19 test result will be advised to try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for five days, which is when they are most infectious.
- Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people, where they can. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend.

The Summer term

Hopefully, the summer term will not be interrupted by any further disruptions. For our Year 11 students it will be their final term with us. They have worked extremely hard in preparation for their exams that begin in mid-May. In addition, Year 10 will be completing Work Experience and we will be holding numerous further trips for different year groups. Please keep an eye on Parentmail. This will continue to be our key method to communicate messages to you.
